Tour Map – Section 6

- This section is down Miami Avenue with its continuation onto Edgewater Park Drive



Starting down Miami Ave



- Return to Miami Avenue on the near corner. Here is 104 Miami. You are now in the Pattison & Iuen subdivision.

Portman House

- Senator Rob Portman once lived here at 203 Miami. He has held several high U.S. government offices.



Terrace Park Country Club



- Turn left onto Oxford. At the end and to the left is the original club house built for the Terrace Park Country Club in 1915.

Summer Cottages

- 501 Miami was one of the original summer cottages where some came to escape the Cincinnati heat. It was built about 1906.



Rooster House

- The Rooster House at 505 Miami was another summer cottage, built about 1910.



River Stone

- This house at 602 Miami is built partly of river stone and was the long time home and dental office of Dr. Robertson.



LeBlond Summer Cottage

- 609 Miami has recently been renovated to bring it up to modern standards – but it retains its original charm.



Charles A. Meurer



- Further down at 731 Miami on the left is the recently renovated home of the world class painter, Charles A. Meurer
- This house was later owned by the well-known bee keeper, Don Cooke.

Underwood House

- Roy Underwood built this house at 815 Miami about 1898.
- He was responsible for bringing electric street lights to Terrace Park.



Edgewater Club

- Earlier there were many clubs along the Little Miami River. At 903 Miami the original clubhouse was modified many times



Edgewater Park Drive

- At the end of Miami the street changes name and some of the houses have ready access to the river.
